Henry Shoichiro Yasuda




Where and when were you born? I was born on July 29, 1928 in Pasadena, California, the eldest son of six siblings. A year later, we moved to Mesa, Arizona where my father farmed and then opened a small market, Yasuda Grocery. My parents sent me to Japan at the age of ten to study and learn the

Japanese culture.

Where were you during World War II? I was attending Tokugawa High School during the early years of the war. Later, students were sent to work toward the war effort and I was sent to the Tokuyama Navy Refueling Depot. On April 3, 1945, I was selected to enroll at the Etajima Navy Academy (the equivalent to America's Annapolis). After the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and the war's end, we cadets were ordered to return home before the Occupation Forces arrived.

What kind of work did you do after WWII? I returned to America in 1948 and enrolled at Glendale High School in Arizona to take a crash course in English and then later attended Phoenix Jr. College. In the fall of 1952, I transferred to UC Berkeley to study International Business and Foreign Government. I became a "schoolbov" for a professor, doing chores for room and board and earned extra money during the summers in Los Angeles doing landscaping and gardening. I graduated from UC Berkeley with a Bachelor Science degree in Business Intelligence Battalion Administration in June, 1953. I received a draft notice and immediately reported to active duty at Fort Ord on September 4, 1953, and served in the U.S. Army (MIS) during the Korean



1954, Seoul, Korea. Henry served in the 502nd Military to review. process & translate intelligence data for the U.S. Army.

War (2 years) and the U.S. Federal Government in Japan (8 years) until December, 1964.

In 1965, my brothers and I started a grocery business that grew into the Tom-sons Grocery stores in Baldwin Park and Pico Rivera. In 1988. I retired at the age of 60 and the family sold the business and leased it for the next 15 years.

Where and when were you born? I was born in Fresno. California. I come from a family of four brothers and a sister. My father was a truck

Where were you during

World War II? From Fresno Assembly Center, we were transferred to Jerome Relocation Center in Arkansas. As camp life was not conducive to raising a family, we moved to Ogden, Utah, where my parents worked as farm laborers. When my grandfather became very ill, we returned to camp. We were sent to Rohwer Relocation Center in Arkansas when Jerome Relocation Center was closed. We were one of the first to return to California in the spring of 1945.

What did you do before you were married? While I was attending UC Berkeley, my two brothers were drafted into the U.S. Army and my sister was getting married. Since my mother had passed away in 1950, this meant my father was left to farm by himself. Therefore, I left UC Berkeley to farm with my father.

Whom did you marry and when? I met Henry Yasuda when we were both attending UC Berkeley. We married during his furlough before he went to Korea on May 15, 1954 at the former Nishi Hongwanji Buddhist Temple in Little Tokyo.



What did you do during the Korean War? I joined Henry in Tokyo in Dec 1954. In 1955, he changed from military to a civilian status. While working in clerical positions at military bases, I raised my family. We returned to California in Dec 1964. When the children got older, I worked full-time at Tom-sons Market until we sold the business in 1988.

Whom did you marry and when? I met Helen Chizuko Inouye while we were both attending UC Berkeley. We married on May 15, 1954.

Do you have children / grandchildren? Helen and I have five children and ten grandchildren. Four of our children were born while I was stationed at the Tachikawa Airbase (see Helen's story, next column).

When did you join Nanka Yamaguchi Kenjinkai? I joined in 1970 and served as president in 1997-1999.

Do you have a special or proud memory? My proudest moment came in 1955 when I was determined to resettle my entire family to the U.S. who were all living in Japan after the war. However, because of the annual quota of 158 immigrants from Japan, I hit a roadblock getting my parents and grandmother back here because they were not U.S. citizens. I was told that it would take an act of Congress to get this changed. I worked hard, contacting legislators; and in 1961, Private Bill H.R. 1572, cosponsored by two California lawmakers, Congressman Gordon McDonough and Senator Thomas Kachel, was passed by the full U.S. Congress and signed by President John F. Kennedy. The bill granted my parents and grandmother permanent resident status allowing them to return to America.

What do you enjoy doing in your spare time? I enjoy Japanese calligraphy, singing shigin, karaoke, and, although I am self-taught, I like to paint. I landscaped the garden at the Higashi Honganji Buddhist Temple and I truly enjoy taking care of the garden and my own Japanese garden.

When did you join Nanka Yamaguchi Kenjinkai? Henry joined in 1970 and I served as Fujinkai president from 2005—2011.



I was able to resume my college education and received my B.S. Degree from Cal State L.A. Henry and I were the Nikkei Parents of the Year in 1996. I was honored as the recipient of the Miki Tanimura Award, the highest volunteer award at the 25th Anniversary of the Japanese American National Museum. But the greatest moments in my life are the times I spend with my family—my husband, children and grandchildren.

Former bureaucrat **Shigetaro Yamamoto** won the Yamaguchi gubernatorial election, beating a well-known renewable energy proponent and two other rivals in a contest that focused on the planned construction of a nuclear power plant in the southwestern Japan prefecture.



Yamamoto, a 63-year-old former senior official of the Land, Infrastructure, Transport and Tourism Ministry, garnered 252,461 votes. After winning the election, Yamamoto told reporters that he would deal with the planned construction of a nuclear plant in Kaminoseki by Chugoku Electric Power Co. "by putting priority on the safety and security of prefectural residents."
